Introduction

This second quarterly report against the 2016/17 Activity Plan demonstrates how we are on track in delivering the ambitious agenda we outlined for InternetNZ in 2016. All content relates to the quarter ending 30 September 2016.

Highlights include the following.

- On track delivery of the Focus Areas, and the projects that contribute to them. Some specific achievements include:
 - Access to the Internet
 - We've been recognised as a Catalyst Project with the Data Futures Forum, for our work that's in development with 2020 on Mapping Digital Inclusion.
 - Participating in the Telecommunications Act process with our own independent view of how to provide better connectivity to more New Zealanders.
 - Use of the Internet for everyone's benefit
 - We've worked throughout the Trans-Pacific Partnership process to ensure that any ramifications of this treaty against the Open Internet are managed appropriately.
 - We've held two Speaker Series events on Death and the Internet and Harassment and the Internet, as well as co-hosted ITX with the rest of the tech industry in NZ.
 - o Identity, privacy and security in the Internet age
 - We've released our work on Easy Transparency, increasing the understanding of how companies can better report on how often they give out private information.
 - We published a Briefing on the Independent Review of Intelligence and Security, and have followed that up with further work legislatively.
- We are in the final stages of assessment of the Community Grants round, with a record number of applications received to further community projects and ideas, as well as held a Conference Attendance round with four grants awarded.
- The NetHui Roadtrip to Nelson, South Auckland and Rotorua is happening early in October, with hundreds of attendees planned.
- Internationally, the IANA Transition work is about to come to a successful resolution of multistakeholder control with enhanced accountability for ICANN.
- We've boosted the size of our team in Communications and Operations and found some excellent people that will help us improve further on doing the basics right.
- We've commenced work on a large and fundamental look at our membership proposition at InternetNZ.

We're proud of what we've achieved so far this year and enthused about what we still have left to do. As per usual, we welcome your feedback, comments and questions about this work. Please do get in touch.

Focus Areas

We have developed a new approach to our proactive outward-facing work this year. Through a process of discussion among members and stakeholders and analysis of the Internet and the broader environment, we identified three areas to focus our work on. These are:

- Access to the internet
- Use of the Internet for everyone's benefit
- Identity, privacy and security in the Internet Age

Focus Area 1: Access to the Internet

Being able to get online is a precondition to being able to gain from the Internet. Through fixed and wireless networks, more New Zealanders than ever before are online, and there are a growing set of choices about how to get online. Since the Internet is ever more important to being able to participate in society, the "digital divide" between those who are online and those who aren't is widening, even as the number of people without access is falling.

Project 1-A: Understanding digital divides

Our **goal** in 2016 is to become recognised as the authority on digital divides in New Zealand, enabled by our data-driven approach and analysis on the issues. This will help ensure that there is evidence to argue that addressable divides be solved.

Project 1-B: Improving Internet infrastructure

Our **goal** in 2016 is to ensure that the Review of the Telecommunications Act results in legislative changes that support the development of high quality connectivity to all New Zealanders, at reasonable prices, and in a manner that allows for Internet innovation.

Focus Area 2: Use of the Internet for everyone's benefit

The beneficial potential of the Internet is nowhere near fully realised. Its ability to foster communication, collaboration and creativity has much, much more to deliver New Zealand - both for economic and social ends. InternetNZ's role is to protect this potential and to promote these benefits and uses. Once connectivity is provided, this effective utilisation challenge is the next frontier.

Project 2-A: Protecting the Internet's creative and economic potential

Our **goal** in 2016 is to shape the discussion on intellectual property, copyright in particular, in recognition of this need for balance in the public interest. When the review does happen, the concept of the generative Internet should be seen as an important one, with a knowledgeable and mobilised community that can argue for the potential of the Internet at the heart of the balance that is required.

Focus Area 3: Identity, privacy and security in the Internet age

Security and privacy on the Internet is one of the primary challenges of our time. Our understanding of what it means to be private is changing in the online world, as more people willingly exchange personal information for enhanced, Internet enabled services. However, we also increasingly deal with the risks and challenges presented by this reality through making informed choices about our privacy online.

Project 3-A: Controlling your data online

Our **goal** in 2016 is to provide leadership, alongside others, about privacy and anonymity that help New Zealanders to decide what the issues are. From there, people will be able to make informed choices about the information they share, in exchange for a clear understanding of the benefits that such sharing will entail.
